### **Komen North Central Alabama Aims to Train More Peer Health Educators through Circle of Promise Initiative's Promise Keepers Workshops**

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., January 28, 2020 – African American women in Alabama die from breast cancer at a rate 40 percent higher than the national average, and Susan G. Komen North Central Alabama continues to work to address this disparity through its Circle of Promise Initiative. This year, the Affiliate hopes to train at least 100 additional peer health educators through its Promise Keepers training program and is kicking off 2020 partnership outreach as we head into Black History Month.

“Empowering people to take an active role in the fight against breast cancer right here in their own communities is the core principle of the Circle of Promise Initiative. Our Affiliate’s Promise Keepers training program allows us to do this in a very meaningful way by providing participants with the knowledge and resources they need to educate and support their loved ones and neighbors who are in need of a mammogram or facing a breast cancer diagnosis. Since the training program began two years ago we have worked with a number of community groups, including churches and civic organizations, to provide these free workshops and we look forward to working with new and returning groups in 2020,” says Deanna Fowler, Director of Outreach and Grants at Komen North Central Alabama.

Launched in October 2007, the Circle of Promise Initiative was developed by Susan G. Komen on a national level to educate, empower, and mobilize the African American community in the fight against breast cancer. Using the initiative to build on the work it was already doing locally, Komen North Central Alabama has been able to expand its community partnerships in the Greater Birmingham area and beyond to do even more to rewrite the story about African American women and breast cancer here in our state.

The Affiliate’s Circle of Promise Initiative is a community-based education and resource program designed to increase breast health and breast cancer awareness, knowledge, and resource access in African American communities across north central Alabama. The initiative is volunteer-driven – guided by the experiences and input of a volunteer committee of African American breast cancer survivors, co-survivors, and healthcare providers – and is active in the community throughout the year. In addition to the Promise Keepers trainings, the Affiliate also holds a monthly support group, Sister Talk, and hosts annual events such as the Promise Luncheon, which will be held this year on Saturday, April 18<sup>th</sup> from 11:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. at the Sixth Avenue Baptist Church.
